
TERM 4 NEWSLETTER



Welcome to this term's edition of our newsletter!

As we bring the school year to a close here at Essendon Keilor College, I would like to sincerely thank all members of our school community for your commitment to making our school an outstanding place of learning and growth. In my first year as Principal, I have witnessed the strong, positive connections between our students and staff. It is a strength of our school community that we know our students very well and support them with their academic and extra-curricular goals.

Firstly, congratulations to our students who recently received their VCAA results and ATAR rankings. We are incredibly proud of all members of the Class of 2024 who successfully completed VCE or VCE VM this year.

A special congratulations to our school DUX, Tegan Anderson, who has been part of the Essendon Keilor College community since Year 7. Tegan is a fantastic role model for her peers, and we wish her and all her classmates the very best as they embark on their future endeavors.

We are pleased to share that our median study score has increased from 25 to 26, and our average ATAR has also improved. Students achieved scores over 40 in subjects such as Vietnamese, Italian, Psychology, and Sport & Recreation, with many scores above 37 in subjects including Biology, English, Health & Human Development, and Physical Education.

We held our Presentation Day on Tuesday, 26 November, marking the first time Essendon Keilor College has come together for a whole-school celebration—a significant milestone for our community.

This event was a wonderful opportunity to foster a sense of belonging and shared purpose among students, staff, and families. Moments like these are vital for strengthening collaboration and connection within our school.

Please take a moment to explore further celebrations of the Presentation Day highlighted in this publication. We extend our congratulations to all award winners and hope that all students who attended feel inspired to strive for academic achievement and success in 2025.

Strategic Focus:

We have seen many successes linked to our strategic focus in 2024.

Our strategic plan goals are:

- To improve student achievement in all subjects at all year levels
- To improve student engagement in learning
- To improve student wellbeing to support learning

Some notable achievements linked to the above goals:

- Student learning growth has been a highlight in 2024, with our NAPLAN growth in reading and numeracy surpassing State measures for both Years 7 and 9.
- VCE outcomes have also shown improvement, as outlined earlier in this report. We are confident that our destination data, which reflects our commitment to supporting student pathways beyond EKC, will show further positive trends next year. This data will be shared with the community in the near future.
- We have expanded our engagement programs across the school and will continue
 to build on this growth to support students in pursuing their areas of passion. This
 includes our High Achievers Program, Sporting Academies, and Performing Arts
 (music and drama). Additionally, we are strengthening Student Leadership
 opportunities and offering targeted incursions and workshops to help students
 make informed decisions, aligning with key wellbeing and engagement priorities.
- We have placed a strong focus on enhancing Student Services expertise and support for students, staff, and parents. This has included targeted Professional Learning for staff, aimed at building capacity and knowledge in areas such as Positive Behaviours, Wellbeing Practices, and fostering engaging classroom environments.
- Our building programs have delivered significant improvements across the school, with a particular focus on enhancing facilities at our Senior Campus to support student engagement and learning. Key developments include:
 - A state-of-the-art science room added to the Senior Campus.
 - An upgrade of all technology in the quadrangle classrooms, as well as a major overhaul of Room 15 to create a more conducive learning environment.
 - Redevelopment of three classrooms in the science wing.
 - Upgrades to media, science and art technology, ensuring students have access to cutting-edge equipment to enhance learning outcomes.
 - Installation of water refill stations across the campus for improved student convenience.
- Looking ahead, we are excited to announce that, over the summer break, we will be
 investing in the development of a Year 12 Study Centre. This dedicated space will
 provide Year 12 students with an environment that promotes effective study and
 revision, aligned with our commitment to high expectations and student success.
- Additionally, we are pleased to share that we will begin the redevelopment of our gym change rooms and amenities, addressing a long-standing need for upgrades in this area. This project aims to provide a modern, functional, and inclusive space that better meets the needs of our students and staff, ensuring the facilities are safe, welcoming, and fit for purpose.

Building Programs Update:

I am excited to share that the college has received an additional **\$2.07 million** dedicated to maintenance and improving our school environment. This significant funding boost will greatly enhance our ability to provide the best possible facilities for our students, supporting their learning, engagement, and overall school experience.

We are making excellent progress with the master planning process for the College, working closely with Project 12, our project design consultant. Together, we are developing a comprehensive plan to address all key areas across the school. Recently, I shared the initial plans with our School Council, and we are excited to continue this important journey in 2025. Once the plans are finalised, we look forward to sharing them with our wider school community.

We are grateful for their contributions, dedication, and the positive impact they have had on our students and school community. At each whole campus assembly I have a message for the student body. In 2024 they have centred around being the best version of themselves, taking every opportunity, having high expectations of themselves and putting all their learning into practice. During Term 4 the Essendon Campus focussed on examination preparation, study and revision ahead of the VCAA examinations for our Year 12 students and the final semester 2 exams for students in Years 10 & 11. Our Year 12 undertook intensive trial examinations in all subject areas to prepare them for the rigour of their VCAA exams, followed by 'Connect' study and revision lectures onsite. These lectures had a pure focus on the exam format and question style and were delivered by former high achieving VCE students currently studying at universities. Feedback from students and parents indicated this program was hugely beneficial in exam preparation.

We farewelled our Year 12s from the campus in style with our traditional guard of honour and Graduation Ceremony held at the Hyatt Essendon Fields. We congratulate our students on their strong final results and wish them all the best in their future endeavours, be that university, tafe or employment.

Our Year 11 students were nominated by staff and invited to apply for student leadership positions for 2025. We had an overwhelming response which is indicative of the quality within the year level. REMEMBRANCE DAY SHRINE OF REMEMBRANCE VISIT

Remembrance Day is a day when we acknowledge those who died or suffered while serving in war. Remembrance Day is the anniversary of the 1918 Armistice that ended fighting in World War 1. On Monday, November the 11th, a few student leaders from the Niddrie, East Keilor and Essendon Campus were selected to attend the Remembrance Day ceremony being held at The Shrine of Remembrance. The three campuses bought a wreath of red roses to lay at the shrine, to honour all those who have fallen in service.

The ceremony acknowledged our First Nations people by commencing the commemorations with a smoking ceremony. Soon after, the Royal Air force orchestra played while four aeroplanes flew over the Shrine in an impressive display. The minute of silence began with the sound of two guns being fired and a flock of doveswere released to symbolise the peace that all fallen soldiers fight for. After the ceremony schools attending the ceremony were given the opportunity to pay their respects.

Our Campus Captain Jaida and next year's Senior site school captain from Essendon, Chloe, took the opportunity to represent the whole EKC community by placing the wreath at the steps of the Shrine and were even featured in the Channel 7 news that night. It was a great excursion that allowed our College to pay our respects while being involved in the celebrations.







During 2025 we are looking forward to continued partnerships with the CHASE program, and have a number of exciting new projects in the works to engage our vocational students with their learning.






YEAR 9 STEM IFLY EXCURSION

Both staff and students thoroughly enjoyed the camp, creating lasting memories of fun, friendship, and exploration in Tasmania.


























YEAR 12 FINAL WEEK


YEAR 12 GRADUATION






Year 10 Industry Immersion – DFO Job Seekers Tour


